## Young Lawyers Section News

Board of Governors' representatives from Broward County were sworn in on June 17, 1977, at the annual Florida Bar Convention held at Innisbrook, Florida. The three members from Broward County who were elected earlier this year are, Michael J. McNerney, Bruce A. Weihe and James B. Davis. They will serve on the Board of Governors for the 1977-1978 year.

A. J. Barranco, Jr., of Miami, is the President of The Young Lawyers Board of Governors for the current year, and John W. Frost, II, of Bartow, is the Present-elect for the forthcoming year.

The Florida Young Lawyers Association Board of Governors assists the senior Board of Governors of the Florida Bar in coordinating various public service projects, but also sponsors many worthwhile projects on their own, such as The Young Lawyers Seminar held several times each year to familiarize newly admitted attorneys with the basic facets of practice which would otherwise only be learned by actual practice. In the past, this three day Seminar has been twice annually at various locations. The first Seminar held in Miami and Tampa, September 26, 27 and 28.

Another project to which The Young Lawyers Board of Governors has addressed itself is the Omnibus Judgeship Bill currently pending in the U.S. Congress which would reduce the number of judges for the Florida Federal Courts. The Florida Bar has gone on record as opposing this reduction in the number of new judges, and The Young Lawyers Board of Governors has undertaken a letter-writing campaign to support the Florida Bar's petition.

It is also expected that The Young Lawyers Board of Governors will add valuable input to the regular Board of Governors in the area of legal advertising as a result of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision on this matter.

## The Image of the Lawyer

The image of the lawyer in the eye of the public is a matter of concern to all attorneys. It appears that the public view of the lawyer is very bad, and it is hard to accept this because it is very difficult to reconcile the adverse public opinion with the fact that lawyers probably donate more pro bono time to public service than do any members of any other profession.

Perhaps part of the problem lies in a lack of communication between the Bar and the public and within the profession.

The public does not know what lawyers actually do. Most of the time, the public thinks of lawyers as a group of professionals who charge extraordinary fees for somewhat routine services. Even many lawyers do not know what public services are being performed by the Association and by other lawyers. Thus, the lack of communication among members of the profession and between the public and the profession is a major concern.

It is easy to conclude that in many instances lawyers do a rather mediocre job of public relations with their own

Lawyers should realize that client dissatisfaction occurs when the lawyer fails to return telephone calls promptly, fails to keep clients informed as to the progress of the case and fails to explain to the client what he is doing.


